One of the highlights of Bess's life was to have had the privilege to train and become a nurse. Her conversations were often peppered with fragments of people's lives she had shared, through good times and bad, and how others had affected her own life.

She was born in Hull in 1920, and lived her young years through the aftermath of World War 1, to find those amazing days of young adulthood overshadowed by the onset of World War 2. She married Robert in 1940, when her outfit had to be bought with coupons and the bridegroom was dressed in his army uniform, including boots, and had to leave the morning after the wedding, not to return for four years.

The family had moved to live in Hornsea, a safer home than perpetually bombed Hull, and they put down their roots here. Robin was born in 1944 and Val in 1946, and, involved in Hornsea life, Bess followed her heart and joined the Red Cross. This led to nursing, much voluntary work with the disabled, running Hornsea branch of the Red Cross, cadet training, adult first aid training etc etc.

Everyone who knew Bess knows she was a lady of very strong, but measured opinions, which she rarely kept to herself. Once she caught your eye you knew she had something of import to say, and that you were going to listen to every word! These opinions were firmly held, and of much substance. Sometimes, you could agree, sometimes not, but you were guaranteed a reasoned argument, based on life as she saw it, AND it went unsaid that a reply was required. If the reply was brief, more was expected. But how often did it make the listener think ... and think again!

She loved Classical Music, and played it through the house to keep her company. She was a shrewd observer of life, always a step ahead. Her Christian faith was a dominant part of her being. In reading her Bible, again she needed to try to analyse what was at the root of each passage as far as is possible 2,000 years on. Was the depth of her faith what drove her nursing career and her absolute devotion to the care of the sick and disabled? Our lives have all been the richer for knowing her, may God keep her safe for evermore.

The Living Well Project has been operating within Hornsea United Reformed Church for approximately four years in partnership with EYRC and other Agencies. The project is committed to tackling and trying to overcome isolation in our community. To do this the Living Well Project team try to provide a pathway back into active community life and in so doing seek to build healthier communities, for the benefit of all.

The Project can offer regular contact through telephone based support and help with sign posting to services that are available. Friendly listening is offered to provide an opportunity for sharing concerns by phone. There could be invitations to meals, courses and activities in the community that may be of interest.

We are looking for volunteers who can spend as little as two hours a week, a fortnight or a month to help reach out to those who feel isolated or lonely. The project has a variety of volunteering on offer ranging from telephoning, driving for the monthly lunch, or just chatting to people.

On-going training and support is given to all volunteers to ensure that the work of the Living Well Project is carried out safely for everyone involved.

In the October magazine I reported on the developmental work Traidcraft was carrying out in South Asia and now I have chosen another developmental project, from Tanzania.

THE BEEKEEPERS OF TANZANIA

We've just come to the end of our BEET project (Beekeepers' Economic Empowerment, Tanzania) - a three year initiative designed to boost incomes and increase the quality of life for rural beekeepers in Tanzania. The results are really encouraging and behind every statistic lies the stories of families fed, children educated and people working their way out of poverty. Here are some of the key achievements...

Diversifying incomes...

Beekeepers have been encouraged to develop multiple income streams to make them more resilient – investing in things like small shops, fishing, selling clothes, poultry and goat rearing.

Women in power

More than half the leadership positions in beekeeper groups are now held by women and in the beekeeper's association, women fill **64%** of leadership roles. The project evaluators noted that groups led by women typically perform better than those led by men.

Making more money

Beekeepers have increased their income by an average of 67%

Making more honey

We helped our beekeepers increase their production by 86%.
