Timing is a bit early, but the Carnival Committee found itself with so many activities to fit in to so few hours that there was little they could do to avoid it.



Our fundraising event is planned for Friday 10th and Saturday 11th August at our church from 10am till approximately 3pm each day.

Last year we had an amazing weekend, raising £3,100.

We were able to support Shirley Crawford for her work with the women and children of Northern Uganda and an amazing young woman called Laura Monahan, who had set up the Liberty Project Africa, where she works to bring freedom, transformation and bright, hope-filled futures to oppressed, abused and sexually exploited girls in Mozambique.

Both women have had exceptional years; Shirley with her 'mother and baby' kits, for which Hornsea ladies have knitted over 1,000 baby fish and chip outfits and crocheted beautiful blankets.

These outfits and blankets together with a towel, soap, hygiene pads and pants are given to each new mum. Shirley has made up and delivered these kits to 5 Church of Uganda rural medical centres.

There was nothing available to these young mums.

80% of babies born after sunset died of hyperthermia, new-borns were wrapped in newspaper. This is where the fish and chip outfits got their name. I have put on the church notice board some photos of the newborn babies, dry, warm and sleeping peacefully in there Mamas' arms.

Laura Monahan, has also had an amazing year in Mozambique. She has purchased a house. The Liberty House is home to 'at risk' women who have support and counselling from Laura and her team of volunteers.

They also provide lessons in reading and writing, sewing, hair dressing and beauty treatments, all of which help these ladies lay a foundation for sustainable futures.

Their new adventure is the Liberty café. This will vocationally train and employ women who come from backgrounds of sexual exploitation.

Please support us over the weekend, refreshments are served through out the day.

These two amazing women need our continued support. Thank you.

Let's talk about Money

One of the first and best ideas in the development of Fair Trade was the idea of a minimum price for farmers. The so called Fair Trade Minimum Price (FTMP) was first introduced following an extraordinary collapse in the price of coffee in the late 1990's.

Farmers were being offered just pennies for their coffee (\$0.40 per lb) and were being forced off their land by the thousands. The idea of the FTMP was to ensure thee was a "floor" for producers, a kind of guarantee that, no matter what, they could earn enough to carry on farming.

Today that price is set at \$1.40. You get a bonus if it is organic of a further \$0.30 and a social premium of \$0.20 per lb (\$1.90 in total). Now that sounds like a better deal – and over the years it has most certainly been a bedrock.

However, over the years something pernicious started to happen. The FTMP has become the price. Trying to get traders to pay above the minimum price is something of a battle, even when the market price is above this level. And this in turn has had a direct effect on the quality. Producers will naturally sell their lower quality beans at the FTMP. And traders will buy large volumes, regardless of quality at an aggregated lower price.

Traidcraft is different. They pay the FTMP or Market Price, whichever is higher, and they always have.

But with their new range of "Eat Your Hat" coffee they simply decided to buy the best quality beans they could find – and thy are paying prices way above the FTMP at \$3.00 and more. These are selected beans from micro lots grown on the best bits of land. It's the farmers best!

Traidcraft writes:-

When we set out to find the right coffees for our Eat Your Hat range, we wanted to showcase some extraordinary producers. Our single origin Honduras coffee comes from the Marcala region, one of the very first areas to send coffee to Europe back in the 19th century. The area is extremely poor – up to 40% of those living in the region live in poverty. Our beans come from a women's cooperative called Asociación de Productoras Libres de Marcala (APROLMA). 69 members – all women – have joined forces to cultivate high quality beans and use their income from exporting them to secure their futures.

Why is it a women's only cooperative? Well, the region is one of the key drug smuggling routes from Latin America to the US: the area is extremely violent, and the men, if they are to avoid working for, or being coerced by, drug cartels generally choose to leave. Many head for the States to seek work and income, which they remit back home.

That leaves the women to organise things, and they are a tenacious and inspiring organisation. They have even been to court to try to clarify their right to own the land they have farmed for generations: not a simple matter given the general state of affairs and if this were not unbelievable enough, the coffee is excellent: organic, naturally harvested and fermented. It really is a case of eating your hat, and we'd love to invite you to try a cup. If there are any coffee connoisseurs reading this I will be delighted to order something from you to try.

Traidcraft is also pioneering an "Eat Your Hat" chocolate range – but that's another story
