Dear Friends

Back Yet Forward

I recently went to see the 'Made in Hull' installation in Victoria Square. It was the beginning of the celebration of Hull's Year of Culture 2017. I went with Margaret and we were both very impressed, it offered a taste of what we might experience in the year.

It projected on the walls of three buildings images and sounds of Hull, its past life; the things that made it great and the disasters it experienced; the way it was bombed and demolished during the war years; the life of the men who made their living from fishing; and those who died doing this; the people who had achieved great things and served Hull in their own profession. We then went to see a similar show near The Deep and the changes to the area around it, especially the newly renovated Humber Street.

I had been into Hull to see the changes but could see that new life was being breathed into the area, yet in the same week the Media placed Kingston upon Hull in the Top Ten worst places to live, due to low life expectations

You may be wondering why I am sharing this with you. Well it seems to me that the great promise offered by this diverse and interesting year is very special, and will make a great difference to Hull. There were hundreds of people out that evening, all wanting to be part of this change, and it brought the large community together with the promise of surprises throughout the year.

I see similarities with this promise to the one we can all receive from God. He can surprise us and lead us to see things differently.

He breathes new life into our life

He can see when we are weary, tired, and needing restoration

He offers hope to those who are lost

He brings people together and challenges the perceptions of each other.

<<So I would like to say to the people and Media who criticise Hull, give it a chance. Instead of seeing the negative aspects that are present in all areas in the country, try and focus on the positive, look at the things that are happening now, and the opportunities that arise from this.

In God's eyes everyone is entitled to a second chance, everyone makes mistakes and finds themselves not knowing what to do. God gives people the opportunity to start again to change their ways. To embrace the promise of God and allow him to lead us in the right direction, is just like engaging with the activities in this important year in Hull , allowing it to make Hull special as God is special to us.

The Leprosy Mission

The Leprosy Mission England and Wales have 5 ongoing projects which need support.

We are asked as a church to select one project to support for the next three years, we will be given more information on the project we select and bi-annual feedback, case studies of leprosy-affected people who are being blessed by your support and a detailed annual report of the progress and future needs of the project.

Is this something we would like to do with the funds we raise each year for TLM? If so, please read about the projects and let me know which you think we should support.

Project 1:Iphiro Yohoolo Education Project, Capo Delgado, Mozambique

60% of Mozambique's population live below the poverty line and life expectancy is just 50 years. The life changing project 'Iphiro Yohoolo' ('Road to the Future') project opens the door to a better future for children and young people through schooling.

Your gifts will provide free school uniforms, supplies and equipment for 200 children, with a focus on teaching girls who are often denied an education.

Importantly, establishing parents' groups ensures children get support at home and educating the older generation will prevent the poverty cycle repeating itself.

Every child deserves the chance to flourish and find a place in the world; your contributions will make sure this happens.

Project 2:

Anandaban Leprosy Hospital, Kathmandu, Nepal

Over half of the people living in Nepal live below the poverty line of \$1.25USD per day. The limited health care services are difficult to access or provide inadequate support for leprosy affected people.

Anandaban, a specialist leprosy hospital in Kathmandu, is the main centre for leprosy treatment to a population of around 27 million people and is a beacon of hope for leprosy-affected people.

In much of Nepal stigma, superstition and a woeful neglect of leprosy services means those affected by leprosy are rejected by their families and communities. Many of the 3000+ people who contract the disease each year do not seek or cannot access the treatment they need.

With your support Anandaban hospital can continue its wonderful work, curing leprosy and healing hearts and lives.

Project 3:

Chanchaga Orthopaedic Workshop, Niger State, Nigeria.

Nigeria has the highest population in Africa, at 174 million. Sadly, an estimated 20 million of these people live with disabilities, the majority of whom need mobility assistance and orthopaedic appliances.

This includes over 20,000 leprosy patients with permanent disabling conditions who are in need of protective footwear or disability aids.

The workshop supports all people with disabilities caused by leprosy, diabetes, accidents, injuries, polio, and congenital anomalies.

Chanchaga Orthopaedic Workshop provides free prosthetic limbs and disability aids to those who cannot afford to pay for treatment. It gives disabled people their mobility and freedom, and their dignity back.

Your support will help the team assist thousands of people to have the freedom of mobility.

Project 4: Purulia Hospital, West Bengal, India.

West Bengal has one of the highest leprosy rates in India, with India itself having more than half the worlds newly detected cases each year. Of the 2.1 million population, almost 40% live below the poverty line.

<<< Purulia Hospital provides crucial support for thousands of patients from the most vulnerable sections of society, including women and children living in extreme poverty. Significantly it's the only health centre providing specialised leprosy care and reconstructive surgery for leprosy related disabilities in Purulia district.

Distressingly around 12% of new leprosy cases treated at the hospital are children. Without early treatment, these children face a future of exclusion from school, disability, stigma, and rejection.

Vital support from you will enable Purulia Hospital to continue its amazing work to heal and support vulnerable children and transform lives for all people affected by leprosy in West Bengal.

Project 5:

Danja Hospital, Maradi Region, Niger

Maradi Region is in the south of Niger on the border with Nigeria. Leprosy remains a huge problem here. Worryingly, there has been an increase over the last few years of new leprosy cases with grade-2 disability – this means the patients being diagnosed with leprosy for the first time but who already have significant disabilities.

Danja hospital is the only specialist leprosy hospital in Niger and the only active leprosy referral hospital, ensuring that patients who can't be treated by local health facilities are still able to be cured and healed of leprosy.

In addition to ensuring the ongoing provision of services by the hospital, funding is also needed for the running of community surgical camps for those too unwell to travel, providing specialised shoes and

prosthetics to protect leprosy damaged feet and limbs, as well as physiotherapy training for hospital staff and other health workers. There is also a great need to train government health workers in early detection of leprosy and correct treatment of the disease.

Your support will truly bless and improve the quality of life for people affected by leprosy in Niger.
