Frank loved Hornsea, indeed Holderness, and when, in the 1950s, he and Thelma moved to Norwich, it wasn't long before they were back – even though, as he delighted to tell me when we first came to Hornsea - the wind is much sharper here!

Wind or no wind, Frank needed to be out in the countryside, or the town, exploring and remembering every nook and cranny, every unusual building, stile or gate; photographing it, so he could delight hundreds of us with the most intimate secrets of our area. His local knowledge was encyclopaedic.

On 28th January 1934, as his 15th birthday approached, Frank became a member of Hornsea Congregational Church, a membership he treasured every day since. He was a man of action, and over the years could be seen almost daily attending to some thing or other around the building he loved. No point asking Thelma where he was if he wasn't at home – we all knew.

But his membership, and later Eldership of the United Reformed Church, was also one of a deep, sincere and quiet faith. He loved hymns, looking deep into the nuances of the words, his Bible was his constant companion, and he regarded it as a great privilege to be asked to read a Sunday lesson.

But our Church is our people, and Frank has loved, prayed for, supported and encouraged many, many of our folk over the years. Their faith has been enriched by his love of God and by his friendship.

Frank lived to a great age, 97, so was a man of several generations. He welcomed and supported ministers who came and went, and was always ready to give 'something extra' in times of vacancy.

As we say our farewells, we think especially of Thelma and the family, whose loss is the greater, and pray for them in the days to come. For ourselves, we have been honoured to know, to love and to share our worship and our Lord with Frank, may he rest safe in God's keeping.

The picture was created with closest care by Maureen, whose personal faith was at the heart of all in her life: her childhood with her siblings, her amazing creative talents, her family of Christina, Kieran and Gemma, and all her friends for whom she has done, and has meant, so much.

A radiant smile, twinkly eyes, and an ability 'to create something beautiful out of nothing', were what we all knew of Maureen. She loved to spend time with children, exploring their latent creativity. Activities like 'Messy Church', Holiday Club and Junior Church were dreamt up for people like her, the use of colour, the exploration of tactile materials, the anticipation and joy (or laughter) of what might come out at the end of it all, taught us all to be more aware of all around us.

Maureen was born in Barnsley, where her creative talents, and those of her sisters and brother were nurtured, but one talent, for making lovely food, helped her get a job as cook/housekeeper at Tickton Grange (then still a private house) and thus she came to the East Riding. Eventually she settled at 13, Ebor Avenue, a sanctuary and haven for all whom she cared about.

Her philosophy that no little thing should be wasted was borne out in her tireless fundraising for 'Save the Children', which she achieved through various avenues, not least a stall at the Freeport.

She lived by the verse: "This is the day that the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad in it' and each day gave her new smiles to share with others.

We are blessed to have known and shared time with Maureen, we will miss her spiritual inspiration, all her smiles so freely given, and we offer our heartfelt sympathy to Christina, Gemma and Kieran in their great loss. May she rest in peace in the ever-loving arms of Jesus.

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Dear Friends

We the Elders have been tasked with writing the 'comment' in the church magazine, and this month it falls to me. I have thought long and hard about what to talk about - November is when the nights are darker since the clocks went back at the end of October, and when a few folks cope with post-holiday withdrawal by planning the next summer holiday!

Brighter, warmer days seem a long way off and although the month is dark, there have been some notable events which have happened in November which have lifted the spirits - the end of the Great War, our Queen married the Duke of Edinburgh, archaeologist Howard Carter had his first glimpse through a hole in a door of King Tutankhamun's tomb - all hugely significant events in their own way, each with some degree of hope and expectation attached.

We look forward to the start of Advent - the word means "coming" or "arrival" and is marked by a spirit of hope - one of expectation and anticipation, one of preparation and longing - in some ways similar to that felt by those involved in the events mentioned above.

As we look forward to this celebration of Advent, I am always reminded of the similarities in the expected arrival of all babies; for those of you who don't know I am a midwife, and even after almost thirty years I am still amazed at the miracle of birth and feel privileged to be present. I am sure that although 2000 years separates us, Mary and Joseph would have had similar hopes, worries and expectations that every expectant couple go through - when will it happen? Will everything be okay? Will the baby be alright?

Although we know it was God's will, this tiny baby was born to a very young, unmarried girl who undertook a long and exhausting journey to a city where she knew nobody. Although aware of God's plan and trusting in Him, Mary must still have been terrified; alone, in pain and delivered in a dirty, animal-filled stable.

Thankfully such situations do not happen today and babies are born in warm, clean surroundings with parents supported by family, friends, midwives and doctors. The circumstances are very different, >>>>

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<><< but the process is still the same and all new parents go through similar feelings.

As Christians we await with anticipation the celebration of the birth of the Son of God in December, (although I have seen one shop in town which has had its window decked out in all things Christmas since September!!). We live in hope and faith that God, however distant He sometimes seems in a difficult world which sees such suffering, will bring a King who will rule with truth, justice and righteousness over His people and in His creation...

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Vision For People With Sight Loss

The heading is the strap line for the Torch Trust for the Blind, an international Christian charity which supports blind and partially sighted people in their Christian lives and provides outreach support for individuals experiencing sight loss for the first time.

In July and October myself and Nicky Dixon, two visually impaired volunteers with our Living Well project teamed up with James Seager of Torch to provide training in visual impairment for around thirty people at the URC and in Hornsea Methodist Church.

The Living Well team has recently received an increasing number of requests to support older people losing their sight and the local Churches Together group wished to explore ways of promoting the inclusion of visually impaired people in church worship and life. The half day sessions were attended by volunteers, church leaders and members.

There were several key learning points. As one person in five over 75 has sight loss many experience social isolation, loneliness and levels of depression. Several common eye conditions are treatable if identified early enough and eye health checks are free at the opticians for over sixties and should be taken at least every two years or annually if at risk.

Levels of vision vary enormously and when offering assistance we should always ask the individual how best we can help. Don't assume but do speak to someone and say who you are as they may not be able to recognise you. People may use several different formats for reading in church and at home and we all need to review the way we provide and present things to ensure that everyone has the opportunity to be included.

Torch offers a wide range of services including literature in large print, Braille, on digital CDs, memory sticks and on line. It can provide >>>>

<<<< and set up transcription services and advice for churches; holidays including in Yorkshire; telephone support and book clubs by phone; moving forward rehabilitation courses; local fellowship groups, including Bridlington and Hornsea; and support for local churches engaged in support of visually impaired members.

There are a wide range of statutory and voluntary services but often people are unaware or unable to contact these. For further information or advice please speak to me or to one of the Living Well project team leaders.
