It maybe that you actually require a new sofa, but, if like me, you have managed very successfully without a new sofa for 364 days of the year, then why is there an expected need and urgency to purchase a new sofa to enhance your Christmas? But it is not just furniture that is advertised earlier and earlier each year.

On a recent visit to Hornsea Garden Centre (at Sigglesthorne) I noted that the series of Christmas meals had already started on Thursday 28th September! The entire store was crammed full of "must haves" for Christmas such as a round metal robin, the size of a football, on springs; a pink unicorn with a sparkling horn, and a number of artificial trees festooned with lights – one of which was on special offer at £1,999.00! Why not have two, I thought, especially as my husband was considering applying for a temporary position as one of Santa's Elves and I was hoping for a BOGOF (Buy One, Get One Free)!

So what is all this aggressive marketing which begins as soon as the children go back to school in September about? Christmas is certainly a time for thinking about giving and receiving. How often in days gone by do we remember children happily playing more with the empty boxes rather than the gifts inside. Do we need to go back to basics?

Paul makes it clear in 1 Corinthians Chapter 4 verse 7 that we should regard everything we have as a gift from God. Justin Welby, the present Archbishop of Canterbury, suggests that this text puts stewardship at the centre of Christian life. We should not simply regard the gifts we have received as being purely for our own advantage.

We may not all be talented artists, musicians or writers but we can still use our gifts in the service of others. We are all urged to regard our work or any simple, everyday task, as something we do for the common good. Just like the woman who kept a notice above her kitchen sink which read "Divine Service conducted here three times daily".

Perhaps the thought to hang onto at this time of year as Advent approaches, is to remember God's greatest gift to us, his Son, whose arrival was marked by gifts. The question for us is "what can we give him?"

What difference does it make to choose fairly traded gifts and produce?

Perhaps Joyce's story may help us to understand.

Joyce Chibouro and her family will have access to electricity for the first time this winter – thanks to the Fairtrade premium on sales of sugar.

Fair Trade 11

Joyce is a member of Kasinthula Cane Growers Ltd in Malawi, which supplies Traidcraft with sugar. She and her neighbours in the village of Chinangwa already know about the benefits of fair trade, as they enjoy clean, fresh water from a borehole paid for with the Fairtrade premium.

"The fair trade programme is doing good things here," Joyce said. "The village where I live has one borehole and is to receive electricity. It is very exciting. We never believed this would be possible!"

So what difference will electricity make to Joyce's life?

"Now when we are going to cook we use the firewood. When we have electricity we will be able to use it for cooking. Now I need to use a lamp but we will be able to use electricity for light and we will have fridges to keep food fresh."

Joyce wants to provide the best for her son, Chiyembekezo. His name means "waiting for something good" and Joyce believes that people in the UK can play a part in helping her son – and other sugar farmers' families – to enjoy something good as they grow up.

"I want my baby to have a good future," she said. "If I am able to get more money, I could send him to high school so he may stand by himself in the future.

Joyce is just one of the thousands of people, and their communities, who are befitting from trade that is conducted fairly. There are no charity handouts just respect for all in the production chain, enabling everyone to flourish and have a life with hope.

We are the consumer end of the chain and it is us that will keep this fairness flowing!
