

a) Wider involvements

1. North Holderness Churches Together (NHCT)

There has been a renewed vibrancy within NHCT, or more accurately within the different denominations in Hornsea. There has always been a willingness to share events and facilities but there is a greater feeling of shared Mission.

The bi-monthly meetings have purpose and all churches have taken an active part in this years events:-

- The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in January
- The Easter Pilgrimage
- The AMAZING 'Pentecost Praise Party' in the Floral Hall with puppets, sketches, worship and fun. This really was a step of faith and the rewards were great, with hundreds of people attending and confirmation of what can be achieved through prayer and trust in the Lord.
- The Carnival Service was well attended in July.
- Revd. Richard Rice-Oxley preached at the Unity Service in a packed St. Nicholas church.
- August saw several churches supporting the Christian Biker's Service.
- The NHCT funded the popular 'It's your move' booklet for all year six pupils moving to secondary school in September as well as two workshops by 'Label of Love' – one in a primary School and one in the secondary.
- Regular prayer meetings each week.

Hornsea URC send four representatives to this group who all play an active part in the planning and preparation of events and activities.

2. Women's World Day of Prayer

The Women's World Day of Prayer for 2018 was prepared by the women of Suriname and entitled "All God's Creation is Good!"

Suriname is a beautiful country with wonderful forests and mountains, great rivers and impressive rapids. It is very fertile and provides enough

food for all. In the service the women of Suriname urged us to cherish God's exquisite gift of Creation and to commit ourselves to caring for God's World so that we may pass it on, unspoilt, to future generations.

It had been many years since an evening service had been held for the WWDP but this year it was agreed to hold both a 2.00pm and 6.00pm service. Our Pilots group prepared and presented the evening service which was both a challenge and delight for them. As it was held at the URC the young people were able to spend a few weeks getting to know about the country, sample some of the food and decorate the church appropriately.

The WWDP has a name change for 2019 and will be known as World Day of Prayer – apart from that everything else remains the same. It is a women lead, global, ecumenical movement and the service has been prepared by the women of Slovenia entitled "Come – Everything is Ready!"

It is an amazing and very humbling experience to be a part of these services – we are a very small but significant part of a huge wave of prayer that sweeps round the world from sunrise to sunset. In Hornsea we will meet at the Parish Church at 2.00pm on Friday 1st of March – every church will be taking an active part in the service and if you would like more information just have a word with me.

5. The Leprosy Mission (Accounts)

Thank you once again for all your support of the Leprosy Mission.

Your support this year has meant that we were able to send an amazing £1327.00 to the Leprosy Mission. This is from money collected in your collecting boxes and £375 from the sponsored walk I did earlier in the year.

After the World Leprosy Sunday service in January some of you were moved by the plight of people in Niger and asked if we could raise money for a well for clean water to help the people of Danja village. Each well costs £800 and I have asked that our donation this year goes to help the people in Danja get clean water.

The total raised across the country by World Leprosy Sunday this year was over £180,000 for the Danja project in Niger.

Thank you to everyone who has a collecting box, it is amazing how your small change adds up over the year. Plenty more are available if you don't have one yet!

Our continued support is needed as someone is diagnosed with leprosy every two minutes, that is over 200,000 every year. The more work TLM can do to raise awareness and remove the stigma of leprosy means people will come forward for treatment when it can still be cured and before they have suffered irreversible disabilities.

As you know I am the Regional Speaker for the Leprosy Mission covering the area from Scarborough down to Hull so if you know any group who would welcome a talk about the work of the Leprosy Mission please let me know.

6. Traidcraft and Fairtrade (Accounts)

Well what a year it has been for Traidcraft and all who support their stance on trading fairly!

The year started with continued positivity of reaching more producers and giving them the opportunities to trade their way out of poverty. They were also looking forward to celebrating 40 years of radical action and challenge to the way the 'free trade' economy undervalues people in the supply chain, which in turn fuel poverty across the developing world.

The 2018 Autumn/Winter catalogue had some of the best products they had carried and as we headed to the Roadshow at Haxby in September, full of enthusiasm and excitement to see the new stock, we were devastated to hear that Traidcraft plc would most probably have to cease trading at the end of December.

What followed in the next three months was not far from miraculous – 'fairtraders' and supporters across the country pulled out all the stops, wrote letters of support, held thousands of stalls and events to achieve the best sales ever. We did our bit in Hornsea too, increasing our sales by almost £2,000. The 'Stock Clearance' sale enabled us to send £700 to Traidcraft Exchange who will now be working hard to find new markets for the producers affected by this situation.

I am pleased to say that Traidcraft plc has a future – not quite as we know it now – but all will become clearer as 2019 progresses. What does that mean for us? Well, a reduced stock choice which will be mainly food and drink, chocolate, sweets and consumables. It will also mean that we have to make a conscious choice to buy, on a regular basis, from Traidcraft if they are to be able to continue to challenge unfair market practices – I am sure we are all up for the challenge! As for Fairtrade itself – all is going well. Fairly traded products are readily available in most supermarkets and it continues to increase its market share. Fairtrade Hornsea continues to flourish with regular features in the Hornsea Community News, a Fair Football Competition in May, a Fairtrade Roadshow in July and an enthusiastic Steering Group who find creative ways to celebrate and promote Fairtrade. Watch out for Fairtrade Fortnight 25th February - 10th March!

7. Residential Homes Monthly Services

Thirty three services have been held in three homes ie The Promenade, Stuart House and Summer Court Hall, over the past year.

All this seems to happen seamlessly but behind it all is a FANTASTIC team of volunteers who give their time willingly, virtually every week, to serve and support all who come through our doors.

3. Living Well (Accounts)

2018 has again been a positive year for the project which has been able to consolidate and develop its role of promoting health and well being in Hornsea and the surrounding areas by combating loneliness and social isolation. It now provides a telephone support and information service to more than ninety vulnerable adults of all ages throughout the East Riding. With the support of the Smile Foundation it has been awarded a very substantial grant which enables us to continue to provide services until at least the end of 2020. This has placed us in a strong position to respond to a growing number of referrals from health trainers and link workers at GP surgeries.

We have been able to reconnect with folk experiencing long term mental health issues by providing a cooking for one programme funded from a grant gifted by the organisers of the Humber Bridge Marathon. As a result of feedback from participants we have run a healthy lifestyle programme between October and December which has been attended by more than thirty people. This offered opportunities to manage your own health in a friendly and supportive group. Activities included chair exercises, relaxation techniques, coping with anxiety and healthy eating. A further programme is planned for February and March. The social craft group on Tuesday afternoons continues to be attended by more than thirty people.

We continue to work closely with the ERYC social prescribing team and other local voluntary and community groups. The whole project depends on the commitment of volunteers who understand and appreciate the effects that loneliness and isolation can have on people's lives. Currently, we have forty volunteers helping with telephone support, cooking and serving meals, acting as table hosts, driving, providing talks and entertainment and administration. New volunteers are always welcome and if you would like to know more please speak with any member of the leadership team, June Barton,

It is also good for parents, grandparents and carers to be able to socialise with others who have children of the same age".

5. Pilots (Accounts)

It has been another busy and amazing year with the Pilots with several 'stand out' events.

In March the Pilots lead the Women's World Day of Prayer evening service for all the churches in Hornsea. It was fun to do and well received.

We have built several new links with the Yorkshire Synod through Megan Tillbrook and Steph Hoyle, Children and Young People Development Practitioners for Yorkshire URC, through events like the Marrick Priory and Wilderness camps, Big Day Out and Children's Party.

Beach Nights and BBQ's are always a highlight of the Summer Term but it is the Autumn Term that is the busiest with the Pilots picking fruit from the Community Orchard and then preparing it for the Harvest Festival and church meal.

We had great fun with 'odd shoes' and other activities when we learnt about the work of the Leprosy Mission followed by three weeks of learning about the story of Jonah and the ups and downs of life. The Pilots had an incredible night filling hundreds of Shoe Boxes for Operation Christmas Child – thanks to Mandy Hood and her wonderful team of supporters who collected, sorted and wrapped most of the items.

We invited people to light a candle on All Hallows Eve and toast marshmallows on the Christmas Lights 'Switch on Night'.

The busy year concluded with the Nativity Service on the 23rd December – which judging by the many positive comments – was just the right preparation for Christmas.

Pilots however is not just about doing 'things' and having fun – through this we hope to bring the Good News of Jesus into the lives of the children and young people who come along each week. We have a dedicated team of leaders who meet together to pray for, plan and deliver a programme that will achieve this. With your continued prayers and support we hope to build on the good work of 2018 and be alongside the Pilots as they explore their journey with Christ.

This lead to almost 40 people attending the six week LYCIG (Lead Your Church Into Growth) Local Course which helped us to see the strengths and potential for growing the witness of our church in the community. From this a Worship Co-ordinators' Team and Worship Group was established, Prayer Partners have been set up, Bible Book Cubs are being explored and the Pastoral Visitors Team is being revived. You may have noticed some changes to our worship since October, with fewer visiting preachers during Advent and a programme on the Lord's Prayer being lead by the Worship Team in January. Church members and even the young people have taken on new roles to help organises services. The Elders and Church Meeting will continue to monitor and evaluate the impact of these changes on our worship and we hope you will bring your prayerful thought to the AGM.

My thanks go to all who have been part of our services. My thanks go to Marion who makes sure that we have ministry each week. Also

We were so sad at the death of four of our members: Paul Banbury, Eddie Berwick, Beryl Ball and Ken Hopkins, all of whom had contributed much to our Church family life in their own individual ways. Our Church membership roll now stands at 73 – our church 'family' is round 116 and some may be drawn to consider Membership in 2019.

As a church we are working more closely with the Methodists, joining them in worship and ventures like the Pentecost celebration, Walking Nativity and Shoe Boxes. Who knows what we will get up to together in 2019?

We continue to support events held by Churches Together in Hornsea joining together for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, the Easter Pilgrimage and Pentecost celebration in the Floral Hall.

As a church we are involved with the Synod, and wider church fellowship, sending reports and being represented at Mission and Care and Synod meetings. I continue in the role of a Synod Pastoral Elder and represent the Synod locally at other United Reformed churches, Jill is the Synod Worship Development Officer and Steven the acting Convener of the Children's Committee. 9. Worship Co-ordinator

The Worship Co- Ordination Team met twice in 2018, initially to define the purpose and remit of the group. The following was agreed:

- The need to agree our approach to worship worship being initially focussed on what we deliver on a Sunday morning
- To maintain oversight of consistency of worship in ways which are relevant, inclusive, challenging and helpful for Spiritual growth and conversion

Our second meeting in August 2018 was to formulate a plan for Sunday morning worship up until April 2019. We end the year at Hornsea URC bright, cosy and safe but to achieve this we have gone a little over budget! By far the most noticeable improvement has been the exterior painting work with 4 windows, 3 sets of double doors, safety barrier and bicycle rack all receiving a much needed coat (or three) of paint. **Huge thanks to ALL who helped with this mammoth task.**

In addition to this a hand rail has been fitted to both sides of the front steps and after years of trying to make the hall skylight watertight we succumbed and slated it over. This has eliminated the leaks but unfortunately the light too which illuminated the three stained glass windows in the church. Four LED lights were fitted in the roof space to improve this but as most will agree it is still a work in progress ... 2018 has seen repairs to two gas heaters in the church, replacement of the gas multipoint water heater in the kitchen with electric, 10 new LED light bulbs in the church and these along with the annual safety and maintenance checks have made 2018 a little more expensive than expected.

Following the vacation of the last tenant at the Manse the property team agreed that work on the bathroom should be carried out to eliminate a recurring leak around the bath and excessive condensation As I write this work is out to tender with the hope that once agreed work can be completed ready for lease again in February.

Turning the house round between tenants can be quite a task and I am indebted to a team of amazing volunteers who have turned out to give it a 'once over', often at short notice, between tenants.

The post of Property Convener is still vacant, it is a rewarding post and can be as big or small as you wish to make it. There is a wonderful support team within the family and extended family of the Church and I would ask you all to keep this post in your prayers.

Church Officers: The list of officers was read and amended.

Reports:

WWDP – this year there will be two services – one at 2.00pm and one at 6.00pm This will be a service lead by the young people.

Leprosy Mission – Carol gave a big THANK YOU for all the money this church had managed to raise for a well.

Friendship Hour: Doreen Rogers was thanked for her amazing work and dedication to the Friendship Hour - building them up into a thriving and vibrant group - but with some reluctance she feels it is now time to hand over the reins to younger leadership.

Fundraising: Ann, Heather, Margaret and June were asked to stand so that we know who are members of the fundraising committee – they are few in number and an appeal was made for new members to attend the next committee meeting on May 10th.

Property: still need a new convener – only essential maintenance and safety checks have been carried out this year.

Newsletter: is now being printed at Hornsea School and Language College. These and remaining Reports were accepted as written.

Financial Report: these were presented to the church with the following observations – our annual offering was down by £2,000 but with reduced M of M we have £3,000 excess income over expenditure.

In the light of both bank closures in Hornsea an appeal was made for as many people who could to make their weekly offering by direct debit – to reduce the amount of cash handled by the church.

Chris Ashmead proposed that the accounts be accepted and this was seconded by Jill Fletcher – passed unanimously.
