The Bible Course

Following on from Church Meetings and discussions we are excited to be launching **The Bible Course** for all who would like to find out more about the Bible and see where the snippets that we know fit into the big picture of God Kingdom.

Discussions, so far, show Monday afternoons at 2.00pm and Tuesday evenings at 7.00pm to be the most popular times to hold sessions - hopefully one other time will be identified at the AGM - enabling as many people who want to take part to do so.

The course will start the week beginning the 4th March.

It is an eight week course accessible for those without any prior knowledge of the bible through to those who have been journeying for many years.

Fairtrade Fortnight continues through to the 10th March

For two weeks each year, thousands of individuals, companies and groups across the UK come together to celebrate the people who grow our food, people who live in some of the poorest countries in the world and who are often exploited and badly paid. This year we are focusing on the people – in particular the women – who grow the cocoa in the chocolate we love so much.

£1.82 is the amount a cocoa farmer in West Africa needs to earn each day in order to achieve a living income. Currently, a typical cocoa farmer in Cote d'Ivoire lives on less than 73p a day. Almost all cocoa farmers in West Africa live in poverty, despite some chocolate companies making massive profits.

For the women the situation is even worse. They may plant and harvest on the farm, look after children, carry water, collect wood, cook and clean for the family, and transport the cocoa beans to market but they are likely to see even less money for their work.

This is why we at Fairtrade are campaigning for a living income to become a reality for cocoa farmers in West Africa. If we can work together with governments, chocolate companies and retailers to make the commitments and policies necessary, then we can make it happen.

As I previous years the businesses in Hornsea are supporting the fortnight by window displays and posters as well as selling and serving fairly traded products.

We can all be a part of this event by swapping our usual purchases for fairly traded ones - if you are in the Coop, look out for the Fairtrade table and you could be in for a 'fair-bake' treat (free giveaways on random days) or come along to the

Hard Times

The last few months have been some of the hardest in our history. Facing up to the fact that the old way of working was going to bankrupt us was tough. We were trying to cover too many bases in an ever more competitive world.

But once we knew what we had to do, and once we felt the surge of support from so many of you, the ride was easier to negotiate. Thank you.

We have said goodbye to many, many wonderful colleagues. We have managed our resources faithfully and ensured that everyone was able to leave with their full redundancy payment and we have also ensured that every single supplier received full payment for all their deliveries.

These are not small matters when I look around at the way many businesses treat their staff and suppliers when times get tough.

Good Stewards

Climate change is having a significant, occasionally existential, impact on our producer friends. As one coffee farmer told us, each year the co-operative is having to plant its coffee bushes further up the mountain to escape the rampant infestations plaguing the valleys due to the warmer weather. At some point, he told us, you run out of mountain, and what does he do then?

We know that the health of the soil is the beginning of all good farming and we are keen to pursue our work with cooperatives who are working organically, feeding biodiversity, developing rain capture systems, processing and re-mulching their waste efficiently. It may mean that we all have to learn to live a little more simply, investing in what is good rather than buying what is cheap.

We are determined to be good stewards of our resources: this means putting the true principles of fair trade into commercial practice.

We have enough to be getting on with, and we want to make sure that our partners have enough too. I hope you will continue to support us on this mission.
