Who are The Leprosy Mission?

We are a global Christian organisation leading the fight against leprosy. Following Jesus Christ, we seek to bring about transformation; breaking the chains of leprosy and empowering people to attain healing, dignity and life in all its fullness

Every two minutes, someone is diagnosed with leprosy. That's more than 200,000 new

cases a year. Although it is curable, millions of people worldwide are living with the effects of the disease, from physical disability to mental health problems, poverty and discrimination.

Everything we do is focused on our goals of zero leprosy transmission, zero leprosy disability and zero leprosy discrimination.

We work in four key areas to achieve this:

Diagnosing and treating

Caring for those disabled by the disease

Fighting stigma and advocating for change

And by pioneering research


Seems we are all missing friends and family, school, going out to socialise, but at least we know that one day, hopefully quite soon, lockdown will be lifted, and we can get back to the things that we enjoy.

Unfortunately, for people living with leprosy it is like living in a permanent lockdown.

Because of the fear and stigma surrounding the disease people are driven out of their families and villages. Children are not able to go to school, people with leprosy are not able to work. People hide their symptoms and don't get treatment until irreversible disability has taken place.

TLM are working hard to educate people not to fear leprosy or people with leprosy and get families back together.

Our first Bible reading is from Luke Chapter 5


Jesus Heals a Man

- ¹² Once Jesus was in a town where there was a man who was suffering from leprosy. When he saw Jesus, he threw himself down and begged him, "Sir, if you want to, you can make me clean!"^[a]
- ¹³ Jesus reached out and touched him. "I do want to," he answered. "Be clean!" At once the disease left the man. ¹⁴ Jesus ordered him, "Don't tell anyone, but go straight to the priest and let him examine you; then to prove to everyone that you are cured, offer the sacrifice as Moses ordered."
- ¹⁵ But the news about Jesus spread all the more widely, and crowds of people came to hear him and be healed from their diseases. ¹⁶ But he would go away to lonely places, where he prayed.

Our second reading is from 1 John chapter 4.

God Is Love

- ⁷ Dear friends, let us love one another, because love comes from God. Whoever loves is a child of God and knows God. ⁸ Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love.
- ⁹ And God showed his love for us by sending his only Son into the world, so that we might have life through him.
- ¹⁰ This is what love is: it is not that we have loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the means by which our sins are forgiven.
- ¹¹ Dear friends, if this is how God loved us, then we should love one another. ¹² No one has ever seen God, but if we love one another, God lives in union with us, and his love is made perfect in us.
- ¹⁶ And we ourselves know and believe the love which God has for us. God is love, and those who live in love live in union with God and God lives in union with them.
- ¹⁷ Love is made perfect in us in order that we may have courage on the Judgment Day; and we will have it because our life in this world is the same as Christ's. ¹⁸ There is no fear in love; perfect love drives out all fear. So then, love has not been made perfect in anyone who is afraid, because fear has to do with punishment.
- ¹⁹ We love because God first loved us.



There are conditions on most things in life.

At school you have to wear a uniform, not run in the corridors, do your homework.

At work you have to turn up at a certain time and do the jobs allotted to you in order to get paid.

Some people put conditions on friendships – I will be your friend as long as you.....

What about church? Do we put conditions on without realising it?

- You are welcome at our church... if you look like us and think like us!

Unconditional means - not subject to any conditions

Unconditional love, simply put, is love without strings attached. It is love you offer freely. You don't base it on what someone does for you in return.

You simply love them and want nothing more than their happiness.

There are many stories in the Bible which show unconditional love:

Ruth – left her country and her family to go with Naomi to a strange land with different customs and a different God.

The Prodigal Son – The father let his son go and do what he wanted but welcomed him back with open arms.

See how many you can think of, and perhaps read some of them again this week.

Jesus showed unconditional love in His life on earth. He welcomed everyone, tax collectors, foreigners, and people with leprosy.

And in our reading we heard Jesus tell us 'Love as I have loved you'

Can we show unconditional love to everyone?

God's love for us is unconditional.


He created us and loves us as we are.

MOZAMBIQUE 2021



- In 2019, 2,200 new cases of leprosy, 211 were children.
- Large country, but sparsely populated with 29 million people.
- 45% of the population is younger than 15 years old.
- Ranked 180 out of 189 on UN's Human Development Index.
- Two in three people live in extreme poverty on less than US\$1.90 per day.
- Natural disasters, disease, high population growth and unequal distribution of wealth = extreme poverty.

LEPROSY SUNDAY -2021

The Leprosy Mission Appeal this year is for the people of Mozambique.

Mozambique is a tough country to live in. It's the 7th most deprived country in the world. Almost a third of its population is malnourished and literacy levels are low.

On top of this, like us, they are having to deal with COVID-19.
