Introduction

Next Tuesday is Shrove Tuesday- pancake day, followed by Ash Wednesday, which is the start of Lent. Lent is traditionally a time when we focus on giving up something, denying ourselves and beginning our 'Lent journey' towards Easter.

Listen to these wise words from Rev. Barbara Glasson about 'journeys'-

"We are not off to search for the Holy Grail as if it belongs in a land we do not know. The place of encounter with God is right here.... God is not asking that we go in search of Him, but rather that we recognise that He is already with us."

Maybe the travelling is more important than the destination; seeing Jesus on the way, in the ordinariness of daily life. It is our hope that the ordinary objects we will focus on during our Lent services will help us to encounter Emmanuel- 'God with us'.

Opening prayer

Lord Jesus, this morning may we listen more intently for the challenge of your living word, and may we find each day the bread we need to nourish us for the journey. Amen

We say together the Lord's prayer: -

Reading- Exodus Chapter 16 verses 1-3 and 11-20

The whole Israelite community set out from Elim and came to the Desert of Sin, which is between Elim and Sinai, on the fifteenth day of the second month after they had come out of Egypt.

In the desert the whole community grumbled against Moses and Aaron. The Israelites said to them, "If only we had died by the LORD'S hand in Egypt! There we sat round pots of meat and ate all the food we wanted, but you have brought us out into this desert to starve this entire assembly to death."

(From Verse 11)-Then the LORD said to Moses, "I have heard the grumbling of the Israelites. Tell them "At twilight you will eat meat, and in the morning, you will be filled with bread. Then you will know that I am the LORD your God'."

That evening quail came and covered the camp, and in the morning, there was a layer of dew around the camp. When the dew was gone, thin flakes like frost appeared on the desert floor. When the Israelites saw it, they said to each other "What is it?" For they did not know what it was.

Moses said to them "It is the bread the LORD has given you to eat. This is what the LORD has commanded: 'Each one is to gather as much as he needs. Take an omer for each person you have in your tent'".

The Israelites did as they were told; some gathered much, some little. And when they measured it by the omer, he who gathered much did not have too much and he who gathered little did not have too little. Each one gathered as much as he needed.

Then Moses said to them "No-one is to keep any of it until morning" However some of them paid no attention to Moses; they kept part of it until morning, but it was full of maggots and began to smell. So, Moses was angry with them.

Picture and Reflection

This is the first of 3 paintings I want to share with you by Sieger Koder, a priest and painter-

This is called Manna



Our reading told the story of the Israelites receiving Manna in the desert. They had been there just a couple of months when they started grumbling because they couldn't see what they were going to eat. Here we can see them looking at the Manna and saying "what is it?". We read that God provided enough for everyone, and enough on the sixth day for the sabbath as well. Some didn't trust it would be enough though and kept some back- 'just in case', and as we saw it went mouldy. God faithfully provided for them for 40 years, we read in verse 35, until they came to the border of Caanan. This is a story about a people (Verse 1), the whole community. One thing I think we have realised through this pandemic is that we are a global community and what affects one, affects us all. As the scientists discussing vaccination programmes say "we are not safe until we are all safe".



It would be easy to judge the Israelites, but during this pandemic we have known the possibility that the 'shops might run out', there has been the temptation to hoard or panic buy. I am thankful for the supermarket shelves still full of bread, and that I have had money to buy it- of course for some

their income has suddenly stopped and we have seen the rise in numbers of people using Food Banks. There are in Hornsea, people who need help. Let us pause now and pray

Take a moment to prayer for food providers here, and those who are struggling to put food on the table at the moment...


Reading 1 Kings 17 verses 1-5

Now Elijah the Tishbite, from Tishbe in Gilead, said to Ahab, "As the Lord the God of Israel lives, whom I serve, there will be neither dew nor rain in the next few years except at my word"

Then the word of the Lord came to Elijah:" Leave here, turn eastward and hide in the Kerith ravine, east of the Jordan. You will drink from the brook, and I have ordered the ravens to feed you there"

So he did what the Lord had told him. He went to the Kerith Ravine, east of the Jordan and stayed there. The ravens brought him bread in the morning and bread and meat in the evening, and he drank from the brook.

Picture and reflection



This is Elijah the prophet, and our second reading is just a tiny part of his story. There are two accounts of Elijah being fed, one here and one in Chapter 19. The Lord had called him to tell the people- who had been rescued from Egypt, and as we saw, cared for in the desert- that they should stop going their own way and rejecting God, which of course didn't make him popular. The prophet is weary, broken, needing rest. That is a feeling we may be able to identify with. (I was reminded of it when I stretched my dough, and there is a process in breadmaking called 'knocking back'.) At this time there are a lot of people feeling broken and weary. Let us pause and pray for them now

Prayer

We pause for a few moments to pray for NHS workers, Frontline staff, essential workers, teachers and teaching staff. We bring before the Lord those in our congregation and on our hearts and ask for the peace and love of Jesus to be in each situation.

God of hope,

Each day your love breaks through our darkness,

New every morning and certain as the dawn.

When shadows gather round us, help us to be prophets of your loving purpose for our world Amen.

Reading 1 Corinthians 11 verses 23-26

For I received from the Lord what I also passed on to you: The Lord Jesus on the night he was betrayed, took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said" This is my body, which is for you: do this in remembrance of me". In the same way, after supper he took the cup, saying "this cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me". For whenever you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

Picture and reflection



The word 'companion' comes from the Latin word for bread- 'panis' and was originally used to describe someone with whom you shared a meal. This last picture shows Jesus sharing a meal with

his friends, he even shared bread with Judas. He was about to die and wouldn't be with them physically much longer. Here are Barbara Glasson's thoughts –

"How will you know that I am with you when you cannot see me?", Jesus asked that early gospel community, and then he gave the answer as he held the bread and broke it, "here I am".
