Coffee Morning/warm space


A chance to meet up, keep warm and chat over coffee (or tea!). every Thursday. Now extended times 9am-3 p.m. with a light lunch served.

Annie's Eco Corner December 22

Hello Everyone,

December already! Where has the year gone? Obviously, everyone is thinking about Christmascards, presents and what to buy for that particular individual who always presents a challenge! From an eco-friendly angle, try to avoid cards with glitter and shiny embellishments- they can't be recycled. Use plain wrapping paper rather than the shiny plastic-y stuff; try scrunching it into a ball if it doesn't stay scrunched up it contains plastic so can't be recycled. And if you've been very organised you can use the gift tags you made from last year's cards!

I appreciate it's a difficult time for everyone, especially this year with everything costing more, so instead of just buying 'stuff', so that a person has 'something to open', why not think about sponsoring as a gift? There are lots of charities for whom you pay a small amount each month as a gift for someone and they are sent a sponsor information pack and regular updates. We've all seen the ads on TV – the donkey sanctuary, Cats Protection League, Dog's Trust, W.W.F., Canine Partners, Guide Dogs for the Blind etc. this would help charities whilst reducing buying stuff for the sake of it.

We are fortunate in Hornsea that there are venues open as warm hubs six days a week from December to March, so folks can drop in for hot drinks and keep warm instead having to switch on their heating at home. I'm very fortunate to have a log burner in my lounge, so one room gets warm, but the heating is off in the rest of the house. In order to save money and reduce my use of gas I wrap up with layers of clothing. My feet always get cold so I wear three pairs of socks! It costs nothing, as opposed to turning on the heating- warm the person rather than the house, and even just keep the one room warm that you spend most of your time in- it all helps.

Once the festivities are over, don't forget to recycle cards, wrapping paper and cardboard (don't forget to remove Sellotape first). Cards can be used to make gift tags for next year, and real Christmas trees can be left out with the brown bins to be collected and recycled in January. If you have any unwanted gifts take them to the charity shop where they can be reused/re-homed.
