


The Bible Course

An eight-session course helping you explore the BIG story.

Big, complex, old ... just some of the words people use to describe the Bible. Sound familiar? That's where *The Bible Course* comes in. The course will increase your confidence, equip you to read the Bible better and help you to see its relevance to daily life. The course provides a birds-eye view of the world's bestselling book. Over eight interactive sessions, it combines video teaching, group discussion, personal reflection and daily readings.

You may like to do this with a friend or two in your own home or with others at church.



For those new to the Christian Faith

Start! introduces Christianity through six DVD based interactive, small-group sessions. The Start! course makes no assumptions about participants' background or experience or knowledge of Christianity or the church. It really does start from scratch.

The down-to-earth interactive approach of Start! has proved a winner throughout the UK and overseas - and in every kind of setting: rural, urban and suburban churches, schools, the armed forces, prisons.

For those taking the next step into their faith journey

Moving On! is a seven-session sequel to the Start! course. With a similar down-to-earth approach, the course helps people explore Christian discipleship in a relaxed, small-group setting.

Moving On! is for anyone who wants to explore what it means to be a Christian disciple today.

Quite simply, Moving On! is perfect for people who want to grow in their relationship with God, going deeper in to prayer and the Bible. In fact, it's for anyone who just wants to move on.

These are by no means the only 'study' materials available – so 'watch this space' or have a chat with an elder....

Not all 'learning opportunities' need to be a course or programme of study – here are a few that you may like to try You would be VERY WELCOME at ALL OF THEM

<u>Bible Book Club</u> – meets monthly in the afternoon and evening.

We get together and talk about what we thought of a book, what we liked/didn't like, and what we learnt from it- just like a regular book club. You can come regularly or occasionally; it is very informal.

Our Bible book club restarts, always on the last Wednesday of the month, so in September it will be on **Wed. 27th September at 2pm and 7pm.** For September we are reading the book of **Titus**.

Faith and Fellowship – meets on Tuesday's at 2.00pm

We are a small, self lead-group who meet to talk about many and varied things in the light of the teachings of the Bible. It is very informal and topics are chosen by the group. It is a wonderful mix of fellowship and faith where all can contribute and journey together.

Saturday Chat - meets on Saturday mornings at 10.00 am

Again, this is a small group who meet, initially, to discuss the previous Sunday's service — what they may have learnt; what has stayed with them during the week/influenced their thoughts; things that may challenge or give momentum to find out more etc. etc.

Conversations morphs into things that are happening in the wider church and from this meeting several seeds have been sewn that grow into wider conversations about the mission, provision and direction of the church – useful ideas to bring to the Church Chat and Church Meeting.

Looking ahead to October

As in past years we plan to offer, in conjunction with other Hornsea churches, an alternative to Halloween 'trick or treating'. We have done pumpkin trails and parties in the past. Policies and procedures-

Last month we looked at our church Equal Opportunity Policy and this month here is a note about our Safeguarding Policy-

SAFEGUARDING

I have been asked to say a few words about Safeguarding and how it impacts on our Church life.

Until the late 1980's and early 1990's the term 'Safeguarding' in the context in which we now think of it, was unused. The Children Act 1989 established the framework for the current Child Protection System in England and Wales. Over the past 30 years or so further policy and reforms have created our current Safeguarding Legislation. Sadly, amendments and reforms have often come about as a result of exposure of abuse or death.

What is Safeguarding?

-Safeguarding means protecting a citizen's health, wellbeing and human rights; enabling them to live free from harm, abuse and neglect.

Isn't it just about making sure children are protected?

-No, Safeguarding involves protecting all children, young people and adults at risk. Anyone might at some time become vulnerable/at risk due to physical or psychological illness or loss of mental capacity.

But abuse is rare and not something I'm likely to encounter?

-Abuse can take many forms, not just Physical or Sexual. It can include Domestic Violence or Abuse, Psychological or Emotional Abuse, Financial or Material Abuse, Slavery, Discriminatory Abuse, Organisational or Institutional Abuse and Neglect including Self-neglect.

Isn't it just something that Elders and Church Leaders need to be bothered about?

-Everyone should be mindful as to the possibility of a Safeguarding issue. Unless we all have it on our radar, we might assume that someone else has raised a concern and it might be overlooked. Since voluntary organisations are dependent on goodwill, they are particularly at risk and indeed can be targeted by those whose intentions are not good.

So, if I have a Safeguarding concern what should I do?

-If you have a concern that a child or an adult is in immediate danger, contact the Police by calling 999.

In non-urgent situations:

-If you have concerns relating to a Safeguarding issue at Church or just want speak to one of the Safeguarding Officers at Church we are - Julia Clifton and Ilena Williams.
