Steven writes: -

How does the URC work?

The United Reformed Church is a conciliar church. This is a fancy way of saying that no one person is in charge. We are run by councils of the church. All the members of the church exercise that responsibility. So, **church meeting** is the gathering for all members of our fellowship to pray and discuss and seek to discover what God wants to happen in our fellowship. Everyone is equal, no one

has a veto, provided we follow the guidance laid down in a document about the nature, faith and order of the United Reformed Church. One of the things we do in church meeting is to decide who are the members of our fellowship. We also elect Elders to see to the day to day running of the church. They are always conscious that they are accountable to the church meeting.

The church meeting appoints a representative to our next council Synod which oversees the work of the Yorkshire Synod of the URC. Sometimes the Synod asks us to give our views through church meeting on decisions they have taken. We can also send resolutions and ask questions from our church meeting to the Synod.

The Synod appoints representatives to attend General Assembly which meets once a year to consider matters of importance and concern for the whole church. Some of those decisions need the approval of Synod and some may affect how our local church works and so will come to our church meeting. We can ask Synod to consider issues to raise at General Assembly from our church meeting.

So, our concerns and thoughts can be heard by others and so can influence the way our church works. We seek to know the mind of God so that we can be better servants of Jesus Christ and help to grow the kingdom of God.

Church chat- a Hornsea invention!!!

The idea of the church meeting where decisions are made and, if necessary, votes can be taken, makes it sound somewhat formal. As a result, our church meeting, some years ago, decided to have a church chat where members and friends of our fellowship could talk around issues in a less formal way. The URC has a favourite word which is NORMALLY. So normally all you would get is church meeting but we also have church chat. Sat around tables, with something to drink and hopefully something to eat, conversation can flow more readily and ideas be generated which can then be taken up by the elders meeting and/or the church meeting.

So why not come along to our next church chat? You could, like me, even suggest what cake would be appreciated by the participants!


These were the outcomes to the questions:


YOUR PRAYERS.
