
Leading Your Church into Growth

The 2 of us attended the URC LyCiG conference from 28th to the 30th of November in Preston. LYCIG stands for 'Leading your Church into Growth' and as the Bishop of Blackburn wrote " If you are not leading your church into growth then where are you leading it?" So, this conference is there to provide an opportunity for churches to consider and to be given some tools so that they can grow. The course is built around 7 steps or areas for a church to consider as ways to grow.

As we thought about our fellowship at Hornsea URC there were many things that gave us encouragement but there were other areas where we certainly felt challenged. Among the speakers was Robin Gamble who wrote the course and who is coming to lead worship for us in July. The organiser and another speaker at the conference was Ashley Evans and he also is coming to lead our worship but on another Sunday in July.

Robin and Ashley shared with us the honest assessment of the state of the whole church in the United Kingdom and how if we do not grow, we will simply disappear. Post Covid churches were on average a third smaller than before lockdown and have only recovered a little. Yet the evidence does show that when you base your church strategy on the principles outlined in this course growth will appear. The material makes clear growth can be numerical with more people coming to church; it can be spiritual with people becoming more like Jesus or missionary as more people becoming like Jesus take more of his mission into the world.

We were introduced to many thought-provoking exercises which it would be good to use as starters for our church chats. There is ONE thing we could all do and that is pray the LYCIG prayer:



Prayer is the first of 4 Ps. Prayer, Presence, Proclamation and Persuasion which are the central pillars of the whole LYCIG philosophy.

What we both felt strongly was that whatever the outcome of our church chats one of the outcomes would be that we would all want to ensure that everything we did was the best that it could be. So, a few really good events are far better than lots of 'stuff'. At every one of these events, we should feel able to say to people "I'm going; it'll be good; do you want to come with me?" to borrow a phrase from the course.

We are both more than happy, indeed would be overjoyed, to share with any of you our experiences of LYCIG, whether you are one of the people who have been before or if this is something that is completely new to you.

Dawn is coming along nicely; she is such a sweet natured dog who loves her hugs. She is a fast learner and is quickly picking up everything required to be a wonderful Canine Partner, so now she is just practicing the essentials to build her confidence. Her trainer, Sophie, says she is such a joy to train and be around, and everyone loves the "mooo" sound she makes whenever she is excited. Her favourite task is picking up everything for everyone, and pushing the switch to open doors. Dawn is really improving in confidence around wheelchairs, especially in public and busier areas, but continued work is needed with this. She has shown some sensitivity and reluctance to load into a car recently, but this only seems to be with smaller cars that have less room for her to jump in.

We are so incredible happy to share that Dawn recently had a successful matching visit, with a male partner who lives in Shropshire and uses a manual and power wheelchair. Dawn showed good confidence with the partner, and worked nicely with him. They are due to start their two weeks of on-site training together on 27th November. If all goes well, Dawn and her partner will go home together at the end of these two weeks, and will then be looked after by our Aftercare team. If Dawn's partner is happy to provide updates, we tend to wait at least six months before asking for these, to allow them time to settle in and get used to working together. Dawn is just a delightful girl, and we are so excited to see their progress together.

Some of you may remember Dawn the Canine Partner dog, who came to church with Ann, as part of her training. Dawn was sponsored in memory of Sharlah's mum, Dawn Cantwell, a member of Hornsea U.R.C. for many years. As you can see she is going to be working soon, transforming the life of a wheelchair user.
